**Every year, 50 people die from anaphylaxis, a life-threatening allergic reaction which inhibits breathing.**

	Symptoms	Remedies
Local Allergic Reaction	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Pain from sting or bite venom</li><li>Localized swelling</li><li>Redness and itchiness</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Apply ice to site of bite or sting</li><li>Take an antihistamine like Benadryl</li></ul>
Systemic Allergic Reaction	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Trouble breathing</li><li>Difficulty swallowing</li><li>Rapid Pulse</li><li>Extreme swelling/hives</li><li>Dizziness/Lightheadedness</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Administer first-aid with an Epi-Pen</li><li>Get to the nearest Emergency Room</li><li>Doctors will administer epinephrine</li><li>May require additional medical care</li></ul>
